BRITISH Touring Car Championship ace Andrew Jordan was left to rue what might have been after a puncture and a crash marred a promising start at Silverstone.

Jordan had looked good in practice at the home of British motorsport, finishing second in two pre-qualifying runs.

And he continued that form

into qualifying to line up sixth on the grid in his Pirtek Racing Vauxhall Vectra.

be even better for the 21-year-old when he leaped from fifth to third early on, but a puncture led to a unscheduled pit-stop and an eventual 17th-place finish.

And any hopes Jordan had of finishing the day on a high in race three came to a screeching halt when he was forced to retire after being in the midst of a three-car col-lision.

He collided with Steven Kane's BMW – the impact of which sent Jordan into another collision with the BMW of Rob Collard.

Jordan ended up in the gravel trap with no option but to retire. He now lies 10th in the championship standings on 64 points, well behind the leader Plato on 171.

He is 37 points behind ninth-placed Collard and needs a good final three rounds – start-ing at Knockhill on September 5 – to climb the rankings.

# Ellie soaks up pressure to land four gold medals and three world records

DOUBLE Paralympic gold medallist Ellie Simmonds insists she can handle the weight sists she can handle the weight of expectation on her young shoulders after smashing a host of records at the IPC World Championships. The 15-year-old Boldmere

Swimming Club life member, who last year became the youngest MBE in history, scorched her way to four gold medals in Eindhoven, and bagged herself three world re-

cords to boot.
Simmonds topped to podi-

um in the 50m, 100m and 400m freestyle events, collecting world records in the latter two, while she rounded off her sparkling week by carving nearly two seconds off the 200m medley world record en route to gold.

Ever since Simmonds returned home from the Deliving

turned home from the Beijing Paralympics in 2008 as a 13-year-old double gold medallist, the media coefficient has never the media spotlight has never left her side – but she is adamant she feels no added pres-

sure to perform.
"At the World Championships I won four gold medals and I am so happy about that," she said. "Some of the world records I haven't broken for a while so I felt really good to do it there."

"So to do as well and produce those kind of performances was a great feeling and it has filled me with a lot of confidence.

"I'm still quite young but I have always been able to deal with pressure.

"I like pressure and I like nerves because when I am nervous I know I am going to perform to the height of my capabilities.

is now only two years until the Paralympic Games in London so this is a great chance to show what you can

At the London 2012 Paralympics, Simmonds is set to be among the star attractions and her face will become synonymous with the Games as the countdown, which will pass the two-years to go mark this Sunday, continues to tick.

Simmonds was the jewel in the crown of a stellar British swimming team at Beijing 2008, which garnered 41 medals in the Far East – 11 of

which were gold.
And Simmonds is convinced she can repeat the trick in home waters

"It is good to test yourself against the best in the world with two years to go, and it means vou know where vou are at and where everyone else is at as well," she added.
"I want to hopefully defend my title from the Paralympic

Games and show I am still the best in my event.
"I don't think it is too dif-

After the best part of half-an-hour's head-to-head action, with the pair swimming stroke for stroke, they were

both credited with the same time of 40.49 mins - a personal best for Gale by almost two minutes - and equal third

If she had been swimming indoors, Gale would not only have bettered her 1,500m personal best but she would have taken almost 30 seconds
